PASTOR'S NOTES



Living with Wisdom and Gristle

There were nine, or maybe ten of us around some tables, going through our little rituals of preparing for another committee meeting. I was still one of the rookies in presbytery circles, and almost all of the women and men in the room exuded a combination of wisdom and gristle, and every pastor there had been ordained before I had even been in junior high school.

Someone mentioned an upcoming presbytery meeting, called for the purpose of examining an individual who was accepting a call to a local congregation. Like my own less than twelve months earlier, this would be an ordination examination, which opened the tap for personal stories from decades past.

Laughter, groans, and forlorn head-shaking ensued, and one of those stories has stayed with me. The wanna'-be pastor stood nervously in front of the assemblage and was confronted with the question of whether, or not, the virgin birth was true. This is an inquiry meant to dash hopes upon craggy shores; meant to test if an ordinand is orthodox or heretical; meant to appease some clergy and inflame others – this we all knew as we heard the tale of the "examination with no right answer."

That is, until our colleague let the Holy Spirit do the talking and said, "I stand with the gospel of Mark on that issue." * We all chuckled at his wit and brevity, and we were thankful that "our presbytery" was more kind, more welcoming and less divisive (we weren't worried about a few weeds in our patch of grass).

Many of us pastors recount our ordination exams "on the floor of presbytery" as hours of anxiety that were, in reflection, important learning moments that were filled with more mercy than malice. They were also introductions to colleagues who sincerely pray for one anothers' ministries – particularly those "old hands" who ask thought-provoking questions. We also quickly realize that the horror stories – while few and far between – are also important to share and acknowledge.

The memory of that story, and the setting in which it was shared, has been bubbling around in my head for a few weeks, as I have been listening to stories of seeking, receiving, and experiencing COVID-19 vaccines, as well as stories from folks who are reluctant about these same vaccines. Most vaccination stories sound a bit like ordination examinations on the floor of a presbytery meeting: various degrees of anxiety that are not nearly as onerous or debilitating as feared. Some people have reactions to the first, but not the second dose, and others are the opposite, and some have no significant reaction to either, and very few have reactions to both, but in all cases the reactions are temporary.

I have listened to family, friends, and strangers tell me their reasons to opt out of receiving COVID-19 vaccines, and there is nearly always the idea that the decision is "what's best for me." And while I really do understand liberty, and individualism, and anxiety, and trust, I also feel that "what's best for me" has been part of the reason this pandemic is in its fourth surge in fourteen months. No, I'm not suggesting giving up liberty or trust, but I am questioning the validity of "what's best for me" in the face of a mutating virus.

Even if my colleague, in that long-ago presbytery, had mumbled an awkward answer to the veracity of Mary's virginity, there was a 98% certainty that the examination would have successfully concluded and ordination authorized. Why? Because ordination exams are about simultaneous connections between candidate, congregation and denomination. And even during the most difficult examinations we presbyters are trying to model how we can grow together in ministry. This long-ago story reminds me of connections and community. As with hair-raising examination stories, we need to hear and honor each other's vaccinations and expectation experiences, and assure one another that the community is stronger when we are working together.

We will need as much of that as possible (working together) to get this pandemic under control. My prayer is to let the Holy Spirit fill my voice as I listen to personal stories, and as I share my rather routine story of getting a vaccination, for the good of us all.

Our April <u>Just Bring It</u> is a special request from Meals on Wheels: pet food. During this year of isolation during the pandemic, companion animals have been an important source of comfort and strength for the recipients of Meals on Wheels. Yet feeding dogs and cats can be get expensive, and is a burden for many of those on of Tarrant County fixed incomes. So Meals on Wheels not only helps with people

food, whenever possible they help feed their client's pets. Canned or dry, whatever you have available, they will take. However, remember that many of these folks are quite frail, so if you're buying dry food, smaller bags are better.

Another need would be large print magazines. If you have any around the house, bring them on in with the pet food.

Meals on Wheels of Tarrant County delivers nearly 1 million meals per year to over 5000 elderly and disable clients. Volunteers are always needed to help deliver meals. Several members of our church are delivery volunteers. It is generally a commitment of one day a week, and groups of neighbors or

Session Meeting Notes for March 18, 2021

- The Ridglea Presbyterian Church regular stated session meeting took place on Thursday, March 18, 2021, using the Zoom video conferencing application. The Reverend Roger Harwerth moderated the meeting from his RPC office. RPC Clerk Karen Landon took the minutes of the meeting. Members of the Session and guests to the meeting remotely accessed the meeting.
- The minutes of the February 18, 2021 Stated Session meeting and the February 2021 Financial Statement were approved.
- The Clerk shared information from the March 2, 2021 Grace Presbytery presbytery-wide virtual Zoom gathering. Interim General Presbyter Steve Shive was introduced and spoke to the group. A Grace Presbytery 2021 Stewardship Shared Mission Giving video was shared, with RPC featured at 4:50 on the video: https://vimeo.com/gracepresbytery.
- The Building & Equipment Committee reported that roof repairs are scheduled to begin during the first week of April. After the roof is repaired, the property will be landscaped, and then a sprinkler system will be installed.
- The Personnel Committee is continuing efforts in the search to fill the position of Director of Youth Ministries.
- The Session approved on-site worship services beginning April 18, 2021. COVID-19 safety protocols will be implemented for the two services (8:30 & 10:30). Attendees will need to make reservations. The reservation process is still being finalized.
- The next stated meeting of Grace Presbytery will take place Saturday, May 1, 2021, at First Presbyterian Church in Richardson. Developments related to the pandemic, as the date of May 1 nears, will affect whether or not this meeting takes place in person.
- The next stated session meeting will be Thursday, April 22, 2021, at 7:00 p.m.
