PASTOR'S NOTES



Spare Time



Tucked in a corner of a utility room, almost out of sight, is a blue and white vinyl carrying case, which holds a swirling-gold, 16-pound orb and its polishing cloth, nestled on a sturdy heavy -gauge stand within the vinyl case. Back in high school (in the mid-1970's) there was the option of taking a bowling class for physical education credit, which many of us considered an excuse to be out to the school building for an hour or so. My older brother Randy had done that a few years earlier, and after he graduated high school he would talk about going to the bowling alley once in a while with his buddies.

A couple of years after high school my parents gifted me with the aforementioned bowling ball and case, and Randy and I would go bowling every once in a while – Randy also had his own ball, and his own shoes, too (I hadn't gotten serious enough to buy shoes, and still haven't). It wasn't too long before Randy started talking about the arrows and dots that are inlaid in each lane, and how to move the throwing hand from palm up to sideways (like shaking someone's hand), or palm down (for extra spin) and about a dozen other pointers.

I've had that same bowling ball for forty-some years. Thanks to the polishing cloth it still looks nearly new, except that it has a small chip or two missing (about a quarter-inch long) from some aggressive machines. It would probably be considered classic, from its finger-spacing, its composition, and weight -16 pounds is probably a bit too much for "mature" bowlers.

It has been a few years since the last time I've been bowling, and probably more than a decade since I took my own ball to a bowling alley; I just use whatever balls they have available, which is why I'm vaguely aware that sometime over the last forty years the grip styles have shifted, and weights have diminished. The lane indicators haven't changed, though, so I still know where I prefer to stand, and I still think about those subtle shifts in the position of my feet and wrist and how I'd like my shoulder to move, and how hand follows eyes – or wants to.

Some folks might think bowling is as simple as rolling a ball toward some pins, then counting how many pins have fallen. And that's a simple-enough explanation – there is an action and there is a result. But as I learned decades ago there are considerations of location, preparation, repetition, and a dozen or more particular aspects of rolling a ball toward some pins (and we haven't even mentioned being in the gutter).

Some people think that religion, or faith, is as simple as agreeing to a set of rules, and that following those rules will produce a divine, heavenly reward (and, like bowling, some people keep score). And that, too, is a simple-enough explanation – there is a belief and a result. Yet, like bowling, or most every other hobby, job, or activity, there are myriad considerations of how our beliefs and ethics are practiced, live, and shared, through acts of kindness, mercy, and hope. And our beliefs should definitely be used regularly, instead of staying tucked into a corner until we stub our toes looking for something.

2. McCleary House—Maine. During the pandemic, many families lost their homes or experienced months of homelessness. Monies will be used to renovate a house to provide transitional housing, a safe place to stay for a few months, get help and move forward again with their lives.
