#### **PASTOR'S NOTES**

#### **BREWING**

There is a controversy brewing in the Presbyterian Church (USA) around – of all things – an ordination exam, specifically the passage used for Old Testament exegesis (the process of critical analysis). Exegesis is one of six ordination exams administered by the denomination, all of which need to be successfully passed prior to being ordained as a Minister of Word and Sacrament (also known as a Teaching Elder).

The particular passage for the Winter 2023 exam is not part of the 3-year lectionary cycle, and is not even a well-known "tough" passage like when Abraham tells his son Isaac that "the Lord will provide" or when David is leering over the roof-tops at the young Bathsheba, and consequently plots to have Bathsheba's husband killed so that David can take her as a wife. There are a couple of similarities to this exam passage and the destruction of the cities of Sodom and Gomorrah – but the exam passage is darker and more brutal, and the purpose of its violence seems merely to spark continued violence. In case you are wondering, that last sentence is a small example of the exegetical process.

The controversy that is brewing is less about the brutality itself, and more about whether or not the passage should be a required part of a mandatory process, and if the exam process needs to be reformed (the gatekeeper for opting out of this exam is the chair of the committee which creates and oversees the process). Some of the responses fall toward the idea that "ministry is filled with unexpected, difficult issues, so..." Yet other responses fall toward the idea that "survivors of violence ought not be forced to exegete a passage of violence, so..." When I began to read about this budding controversy (during the three-day ice storm) my initial inclination was toward the first category, thinking that this was a squabble created by people who want special consideration, people who are making mountains out of mole-hills, people who want a velvet-lined ministry; thinking to myself that I've been doing this for decades... that passage isn't really that bad... when I took the exegesis exam...

A moment or two later, however, I realized the hubris and insensitivity of such a perspective, and realized that I favor the second type of response ("...ought not be forced to exegete a passage of violence"), which is why I haven't cited the book or the chapter. Ministry is filled with unexpected and difficult issues, and one of the most important things that pastors can do is to be present, be merciful, be open and understanding in the midst or the memories of the trauma of others. Analysis and exposition of this passage, in my opinion, makes a mockery of any and all attempts toward mercy, justice, honor, or attention to "the least and the lost." An ordination exam, and process, that focuses on misogyny versus hospitality, and torture versus compassion (more exegesis there) seems short-sighted and unsustainable.

It is highly possible that you are unaware of this brewing controversy, since it is mostly pastors talking about being pastors. But there are undoubtedly other topics about which strong opinions are brewing, aren't there? We don't always need to change our minds, but it is good to broaden our perspectives, and be aware that what others experience may be more important than we would imagine.





#### Session Meeting Notes for January 19, 2023

The Ridglea Presbyterian Church regular stated session meeting took place on Thursday, January 19, 2023, in the RPC Sanctuary and via Zoom. The Reverend Roger Harwerth moderated the meeting. RPC Clerk Karen Landon took the minutes of the meeting. Lynne Payne, Moderator of the Deacons, was also in attendance.

- The minutes of the December 15, 2022, stated session meeting and the December 2022 budgeted financial statement were approved.
- The 2022 Annual Statistical Report, which was submitted by the Clerk to the Office of General Assembly on January 18, 2023, was approved.
- The 2022 End-of-Year Reports from committees and congregational groups were received by the Session.
- Elder commissioners were elected to attend the Grace Presbytery Called Meeting on January 21, 2023.
- The Session is taking part in mission and vision statement discussions. The process of creating
  mission and vision statements for RPC began in December 2022 and will continue for the next
  few months.
- The 2023 list of RPC Sunday School teachers and leaders was approved.
- The next RPC stated session meeting will be Thursday, February 16, 2023, at 7:00 p.m. in the church sanctuary.

The next stated meeting of Grace Presbytery will take place Saturday, March 4, 2023, at Trinity Presbyterian Church in McKinney. This meeting will be offered in a hybrid format with members attending in-person or virtually.

Of all the special offerings of P.W.U.S.A., The Fellowship of the Least Coin is the most unique.

By request, we reprint this article first published in January, 1974 by P.W. of Woodbridge, New Jersey.

After World War II, a group of women representing the Presbyterian World Council was asked to form the International Fellowship Team of Reconciliation. This team was to go to Alaska, Japan, Korea, Hong Kong, and the Philippines to heal the rift caused by war. One of these women was Shanti Solomon of India. When the Reconciliation Team attempted to enter Korea, Mrs. Solomon and the representative from Japan were refused admittance and so returned to Manila to await the others. Shanti was bewildered. She could understand why Japan was refused—that country precipitated the war—but her country was neutral. After some consideration, she decided it must be her country's neutrality that was the cause.

During a Bible Study with other women in Manila the story of The Widow's Mite was read.

"That's it!", she cried.

When the babble of startled voices quieted, she explained her idea. Like the widow who gave her two small, almost valueless coins, all the women of the world could give the least coin of their country. The coin itself would not be the main objective but along with the coins would go each woman's prayer for the other women of the world. The coin would serve as a t token of concern and commitment. When the rest of the team returned, Shanty explained to them her idea. The American representative said she didn't think women of her country would be interested in putting one penny a month in a collection each month of the year.

"But that's the whole point! There are so many women who want to feel they are helping but don't have a lot of money. By giving the <u>smallest coin</u> of her country each woman will be <u>able to participate equally</u>. The women of the four countries could hold up their heads content that they too were contributing to the betterment of the world!"

Her idea was adopted in The Fellowship of the Least Coin was born. At the end of the first year \$11,000.00 had been given. In two years \$20,000 and after 10 years, one half million dollars, despite the fact that most of these least coins are worth less than 1/8 the value of an American one cent piece.

The grants for 2022 will be used around the world to:

- empower single mothers
- offer job training and education
- help migrant workers with shelter and food
- hold mental health seminars
- provide trauma healing

All to improve the position of women in society. Look what a penny can do!


