PASTOR'S NOTES



Sometimes Difficult

A couple of weeks ago I was talking to a colleague and somehow we got on the topic of doctoral programs and their efficacy for the types of congregational ministries that we have both practiced for over thirty years. My colleague earned a doctoral degree about a decade ago, and while chatting I asked what their thesis project had been about: preaching the difficult texts of Scripture. Now, that opened up some interesting conversation! There are more than a dozen such difficult, awkward, confusing, or embarrassing passages, but since they rarely come up in the 3-year lectionary cycle, most congregations don't hear about them, except in Bible studies.

My colleague and I didn't have time to chat about the recent hub-bub around ordination examinations, but the controversy is about this very topic. Back in February the exegesis exam (one of five required to pass for ordination in the Presbyterian Church USA) was centered on one of the difficult passages, and folks got stirred up quite a bit. There was no attempt at providing a "trigger warning" that the exegesis exam (critical analysis and exposition of a passage) would be focused on one of these difficult passages, mainly because these exams are taken simultaneously, and likewise read ("graded") simultaneously across the nation (so trigger warnings might provide an advantage to some). Many of the objections to utilizing this passage for this exam focused on the violence of the passage, and many others objected that there were no alternatives available if the test takers, or the test readers/graders, were offended, shocked, or disturbed.

There have been many important and differing views on the processes and practices of this particular exam, as well as the efficacy and validity of the exams for ordination. Many a seasoned pastor (like me) has opined on the good, bad, and irrelevant aspects of a make-or-break exam, and some of the reflections and reactions have been impactful with the Cooperative Committee on Examinations. But a couple of things have often been overlooked or forgotten in all of this commotion. One of the overlooked issues was the premise contained in the exam itself, which posited that the exam-taker was already a pastor, and was leading a series of Bible studies on a college campus, exploring unsettling passages in the Scriptures, and that the last study is the exam's focus: Judges 19:1-30, often called "the Levite's Concubine." The difficulty of the passage is part of the process (the ordination exam) for talking about the difficulty of the passage. Another oft-overlooked issue is that these are not make-or-break exams. If any of the five ordination exams (theology, worship, polity, exegesis, and Bible content) are unsuccessful, they can be attempted later. Few candidates pass all five exams on their first attempt; I will confess that I didn't pass the exegesis exam until my third attempt, nearly six months after graduating from seminary (which is why my ordination was in December of 1987 instead of July or August).

Quite a bit of pastoral ministry can be called routine, ordinary, mundane, repetitious, scheduled, and all of that is true – until there is a curveball, or an emergency, or a crisis, or a disaster. Things like tornadoes or frozen pipes; things like mass shootings or a church member being abused; things like embezzlement or adultery; things that no one imagines until they land in our sanctuary, in our neighborhood, in our homes. In those times, the difficulties of ministry can be tempered and undertaken within a community that understands that the people, problems, and difficulties we encounter within Scripture are not trapped in the amber of history. The issues that arise in Judges 19 point to a society that was under threat on many levels – just like now. Some leaders (governors, school boards, even pastors) would recommend ignoring such difficult passages and topics because they are difficult (or offensive), but doing that only makes everyone ignorant and, even worse, vulnerable. Sometimes "difficult" happens, and God's people are strong enough, are capable, and are resilient, together, particularly as we confess our failures and strive to live justly, live mercifully, live gracefully, and live humbly with each other and with God.

They play a very pivotal part communicating options to the patient. In its first one hundred years, the Birthday offering of Presbyterian Women has funded over 200 major mission projects. As we begin our next hundred years, we

are starting with two projects for 2023.

1. Making Miracles Group Home in Tallahassee, Florida. In operation since 1910, it provides a one-year live-in program that supports young mothers helping them to develop skills to care for their children and live independently. Many are wishing to leave a past of abusive relationships, addiction, or incarceration. Monies will also help purchase a second group home for five families at risk of homelessness.

2. Berhane Yesus Elementary School (K-8) in Dembi Dollo, Ethiopia. It helps prepare children of migrant workers, subsistence farmers and displaced groups of people for a high school education and a "life of Christian service." Monies will help construct a much needed classroom for an over-flowing kindergarten that have outgrown the chapel where they currently meet.

The RPC Women are collecting quarters in the Narthex after service every second Sunday of the month to assist Westaid in providing laundry services and supplies to those in need.








Welcome New Members Ron and Linda Launder
