PASTOR'S NOTES



Words of Life

Some of us might just be old enough, and some of us might have been around television long enough to remember a recurring skit on Saturday Night Live wherein a character named Stuart Smalley would lift up "Daily

Affirmations." When I first watched them, they reminded me of an on-going series of commercials that we watched growing up, from Unity Village, for a "word of the day." Over a background of majestic mountains, or a babbling brook, or an eagle soaring toward the clouds, there would be a soft, soothing voice saying "the word of the day is...hope" (or peace, or energy, or trust, or confidence, etc.). This would be followed by some quasi-celebrity who would explain how important, how meaningful, how precious that word was to them, and how it could be for us as well.

Even before I know about the Epiphany tradition of "star words" I would think about those "word of the day" experiences, and there have been plenty of times when such a seemingly simple idea would bring focus to a jumbled day, or week, or season. Since we are about five months past Epiphany (January 6), perhaps it would be a good thing to reflect on these and other guideposts.

For more years than I might want to consider, one of my mainstay words has been "others." It is a fairly broad word, of course, but that is one of its pleasures. It is a mental shorthand for the verse "the Son of Man came not to be served, but to serve" (in Matthew 20 and Mark 10).

The story is told of a minister who went back to his hometown to attend a funeral, held in the church in which they grew up. The pastor noticed that some really beautiful stained-glass windows had been installed in the sanctuary; upon looking closely, however, it became clear that none of the names on the memorial plaques within the glasswork were familiar to them. The pastor asked a friend about this, wondering if it really had been so long since they'd been home that all such knowledge of the congregation had been lost?

The friend explained that these windows had ben custom-built in Italy for a church in St. Louis, but when they arrived, they didn't fit correctly. The company said that new windows would be made instead of trying to alter the first shipment, and that the St. Louis congregation should just try to sell them to anyone interested. This small church saw the advertisement in a denominational magazine, for quite a reasonable price, and decided to purchase them. The pastor asked their friend, what would be done about the names?

The friend replied that that very subject had been brought up at the session meeting and after discussion, the session decided to keep the windows just as they were created, because, the session reasoned, it is important to remember that there are other faith-filled Christians in the world.

This is one of my favorite stories about thinking about people beyond ourselves, and it reminds me that there is a synonym in the Bible for people beyond ourselves – it is "neighbor."

Please join us on May 28 at 6 pm for sack supper with book discussion beginning at 6:30. We'll meet in the FISH classroom. I will lead the discussion of THE FALSE WHITE GOSPEL. The author is Jim Wallis, an Evangelical Christian. The premise of this book is that Christians, especially White National Christians, have sanitized the Gospel, ignoring all the scriptures through the old and New Testament about social justice. He uses many scripture to support his point including Micah 6:8 (What does the Lord require of you but to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with your God.) and Matthew 25 (paraphrasing-when you've helped the least of these, you've helped

Jesus.) These are the verses that Wallis credits for his decision to return to the church. There are things in this book some of us will find problematical, but it's a very important book for all of each of us to read, discuss, and see if and how it applies to our own life. Wallis says don't ask WWJD (what would Jesus do?). Ask What did Jesus do and what did Jesus say. Hope you will join us on May 28.



They provide youth Development through training, wellness checks, student camps, nutritious meals, & organized athletic activities, as well as educational enrichment through reading, writing, speaking, computers, financial literacy, & critical thinking.


