## **A Grand Time**



In the spring our confirmation class gathered at Camp Carter, where we shared food, fellowship, and fun for a handful of hours. The Christian Education committee, and Emily E., our Youth and Family Ministries Coordinator, had put together a wide array of opportunities for conversations and activities, including tie -dying t-shirts.

All of us – students, mentors, and staff – had blank shirts that were prepared ahead of the retreat (thanks to Emily) and after some careful instructions and demonstrations, we spent about an hour rolling, twisting, binding, and dying our

shirts, and then carefully secured them, happy to know that after a couple of days (long enough for the dyes to do their thing) Emily would rinse and complete the process for all of us. A week or so later I got to peek at the shirts before Emily distributed them to everyone.

Each of the shirts were unique, and I thoroughly enjoyed the creativity, the artistry, and the uncertainty involved in tie-dying. I enjoyed it so much that, when our granddaughter was planning to visit us in July, I suggested that we try to tie-dye some shirts, and she agreed. So, I bought some shirts, and some tie-dye kits, and made sure that we had a big-enough drop cloth.

We chatted about designs and colors, we prepared and carefully applied the various dyes, and when we started rinsing out the first couple of shirts, one of hers had unwanted, unplanned, unsightly black splotches. Oh no, oh no, oh no, I said over and over. I felt really bad, because it was a silly mistake that could've been avoided and all that time and effort seemed wasted. I must have said how frustrated and how sorry I was a handful of times, and our granddaughter said, calmly, over and over, that "it's a choice, Grandad, it's a choice."

At first I thought she was talking about the shirt, the smudges, the errors made in how the dies were applied, but then I realized what she was really saying – that my frustration, my disappointment, my negative reaction was a choice I was making. I was choosing to experience this mistake as only negative, instead of as a small, learnable, unfortunate incident.

Of course she was right. After I was done fussing, and after I thanked her for helping me to relax, we finished up and moved on to other things, slipping back into our roles of goofy grandparent and eye-rolling grandchild.

But I couldn't help thinking, and reflecting, and appreciating, what a blessing she embodied in those few tender moments, each of us with a handful of wet shirts, each of us seeing the same thing from different perspectives. The blessing of unexpected grace, of unexpected wisdom, of unexpected patience.

Sometimes our expectations are so routine, so ingrained, so familiar, that we slide right past the blessings of people around us, which almost happened with our granddaughter. I was trying to take on the responsibility for the ugliness, the mistakes, the disappointment; I was trying to make room, and give permission for her to be disappointed. It seemed like the adult, the grandparent thing to do, right? And I almost slid right past, almost mistook her patience for a lack of interest, almost ignored her young-at-heart wisdom. I am so glad that I stopped long enough to pay attention.

She went home with a handful of tie-dyed shirts, and some of them turned out really cool. And I learned – again – that blessings often arrive in unexpected ways.



# Matthew 25 Action Team <a href="Did You Know?">Did You Know?</a>

That the Home Owner's Loan Corporation (HOLC), a New Deal program refinanced over a million homes, and issued low-interest loans to millions of new home owners except for the people living in zones of a city, typically marked on a map as a "red-zone"? These areas where Black, Jewish, and Catholics lived were deemed "hazardous" and "declining" by the National Association of Real Estate Brokers. The practice of denying credit based on race, ethnicity, or religion is known as "redlining".

This QR code (for phone apps) will direct people to our Realm portal for online giving; a Realm account will need to be created. though it is very simple to do.




The RPC Women are collecting quarters in the Narthex after service every second Sunday of the month to assist Westaid.



The Jam Sessions are held on the 2nd and 4th Monday in the Sanctuary from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m.




